- Students analyze qualitative and quantitative data and present findings to HRC.




- The type, frequency, and location that people in Salem experience and witness discrimination


## Overall, I feel a sense of community in Salem




### **Experience of Discrimination in Salem**



67.6% of unhoused respondents experience discrimination weekly or daily





## Three most common types of discrimination



#### **Locations of Discrimination**






