Three Scenarios for a Local Option Levy to Fund a Full Service Salem Library in FY 2026

By Jim Scheppke, Ward 2

What Would a Full Service Library for Salem Look Like?

Our library, with two locations open a total of 48 hours per week, falls far short of being a full service library. There are many ways one could define "full service." One way would be to compare these service hours to service hours in the past. A century ago, in 1924, our Carnegie library on State Street was open Monday through Saturday from 9 am to 9 pm, a total of 72 hours per week. That was certainly "full service" for 1924 when the population of Salem was only about 20,000 compared to about nine times that today! We had a full service library as recently as two decades ago when the main library was open seven days a week, including three evenings a week until 9 am, and our West Salem Branch was open six days a week including one evening. Total hours for both locations: 96 hours per week. That's *exactly double* our hours in 2024. We also had a bookmobile then that made 28 stops per month in locations throughout Salem.

Another way to define a full service library would be to compare our library to a comparable library in Oregon. The Hillsboro Public Library serves a population of over 157,000 from a main library and one branch library, just like our library. Here is how the two libraries compared according to the latest data available from the State Library for FY 2023:

The Hillsboro Public Library is a full service library. By looking at this comparison one can get an idea of what it would take to have a full service library in Salem.

For the purposes of this comparison of three different scenarios for a local option levy I am going to define a full service library for Salem as requiring a \$9.7 million annual budget, with \$4.7 million included in the General Fund budget of the City and \$5 million from a local option levy. In FY 2025 the Library has approximately a \$5.7 million General Fund budget, about \$1 million of which is one-time ARPA funds.

Scenario 1: A 5-Year \$5 Million Local Option Library Levy Passed in May, 2025

Approximate Tax Rate for Median Homeowner: \$0.50 per \$1,000 Assessed Valuation Approximate Property Tax Increase Per Year/Month for Median Homeowner: \$87/\$7 Advantages:

- Would fund a full service library (7 days at main with 3 evenings, 5-6 days at West Salem Branch with 1-2 evenings).
- Lowest "ask" of all the scenarios.
- Potential for a strong campaign that is well-funded by library support organizations.

Disadvantages

- Does not address other General Fund shortfalls to other livability services.
- Does not tap into constituencies of other livability services for votes and support.

Scenario 2: A 5-Year \$8 Million Local Option "Livability Levy" Passed in May, 2025

Approximate Tax Rate for Median Homeowner: \$0.75 per \$1,000 Assessed Valuation Approximate Property Tax Increase Per Year/Month for Median Homeowner: \$130/\$11 Advantages:

- Would fund a full service library (7 days at main with 3 evenings, 5-6 days at West Salem Branch with 1-2 evenings).
- Includes \$2 million to restore and enhance Parks and Recreation services.
- Includes \$1 million to restore and enhance Center 50+ services.
- Potential for a strong campaign that is well-funded by library support organizations and parks and Center 50+ support organizations.
- Taps into three sizable constituencies of livability services for votes and support.

Disadvantages

• A larger "ask" than Scenario 1.

Scenario 3: A 5-Year \$10 Million Local Option Public Safety Levy Passed in May, 2025 That Frees Up General Funds to Address Other Shortfalls

Approximate Tax Rate for Median Homeowner: \$1.00 per \$1,000 Assessed Valuation Approximate Property Tax Increase Per Year/Month for Median Homeowner: \$173/\$14 Advantages:

- Polling may show that a public safety levy would have the greatest chance of passing.
- A public safety levy could address needs for more community policing capacity, gun violence reduction capacity, funding for the new fire station in the bond measure.

Disadvantages

- Unclear how much General Fund would be "freed up" and whether it would be sufficient to fund a full service library at \$5 million, much less other livability services.
- Difficulty in communicating with voters about exactly what they are buying with their tax increase. Some may want all of the \$10 million increase for public safety.
- Could be used as an excuse to not support other, more permanent revenue sources to fund public safety (e.g., Operations Fee reform, Business License Fee).
- Largest "ask" of the three scenarios.
- Livability services constituencies may resent not being a priority and having to settle for "leftovers."
- Support by library support organizations and other support organizations may be lukewarm or nonexistent.
- The Legislature would likely not consider a bill to provide Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) to support public safety services in Salem if they knew we were going to vote on a public safety levy in May.

I ask that the City Council vote to allow the Livability Levy to be placed on the May 2025 ballot, as recommended by the Revenue Task Force. As I understand it, this 5 year levy on property taxes, amounting to about \$11 per month on an average value home, would provide \$5 million for the two libraries, \$2 million for parks, and \$1 million for the Senior Center. I think the levy is quite reasonable and at any rate should be put on the ballot for the voters to decide. I was the chief petitioner about 20 years ago for an initiative to create a special district to fund the two libraries. The initiative got on the ballot but did not pass. We are all familiar with the payroll tax which would have funded these services but failed because it was unfair. The City Council should not be dissuaded from putting this levy to a vote simply because previous measures have failed. They failed for reasons other than the value city residents put on the library and parks (I am not familiar with the Senior Center). (para) With respect to the libraries, the present situation is untenable and shameful. I know from my years of circulating petitions in front of the main library that it is used quite a bit in the evenings and on Sunday afternoons, for meetings and events at the adjacent auditorium as well as ordinary library use. Many library patrons I saw worked during the day so this was the only time they could come, bring their families, etc. Now the concerts and other events are not possible when most people would be able to attend, for lack of security personnel. The West Salem branch, largely built with donations and granted a free lease by Mr. Roth, is only open a few hours a week with no events and even the landscaping is dying. And yet voters want another branch library in east Salem. (para) With respect to parks, I have been a Parks seasonal employee and a member of the Minto Brown patrol for over a decade. Salem residents love their parks and they are heavily used. What is badly needed is an additional Park Ranger or two, making some of our larger parks safer and therefore more readily used.
