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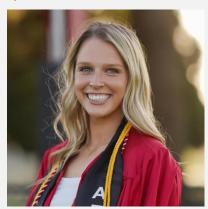

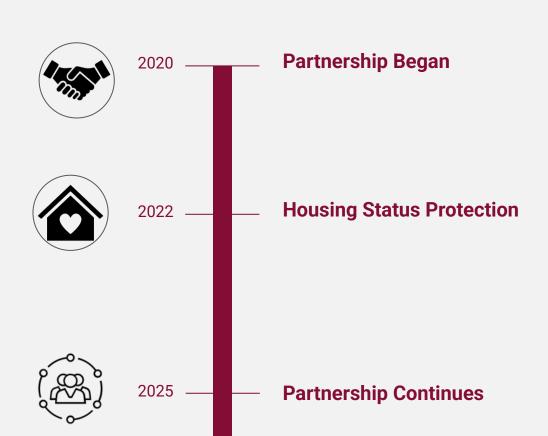




Background









Research Objectives

What We Measured

- 1. Sense of Community How connected do Salem residents feel?
- 2. Witnessed Discrimination What discrimination do people see or hear about?
- 3. Experienced Discrimination What discrimination do people personally face?
- 4. Reporting Likelihood Will people report bias crimes to SPD or HRC?
- 5. Subgroup Analysis Focus on Pacific Islander and unhoused populations.

Survey Period: April 24 - May 14, 2025

Languages: English, Spanish, Marshallese, Chuukese

Methodology

Qualtrics self-administered survey between 4/24/25 – 5/15/25

Respondents: 522 started; 491 completed

Non-probability judgement sample

- Individuals who live in or regularly frequent Salem
- Some in-person intentionally overrepresenting demographic

76% increase
of Pacific
Islander
responses
from last
years survey
due to focal
outreach and
partnerships

- Not representative of the City of Salem
- Overrepresented: people experiencing homelessness, people living with disabilities, and people identifying as LGBTQIA+
- Underrepresented: Latino/a/e

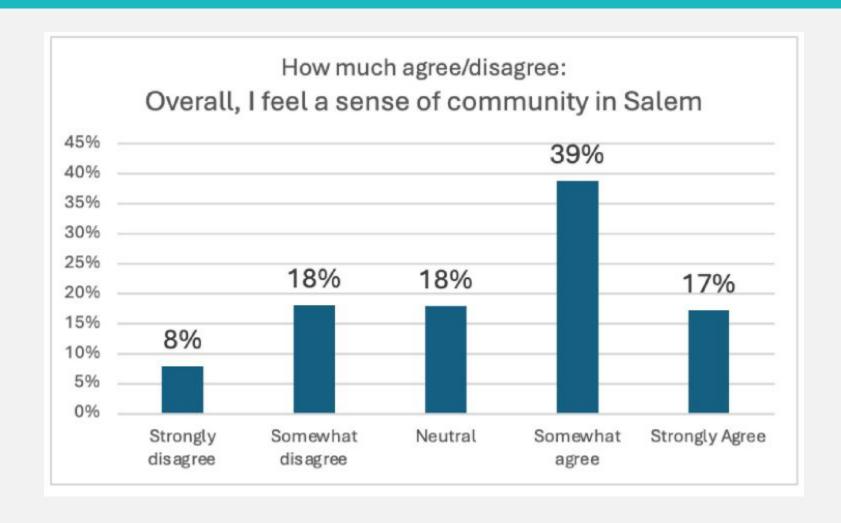

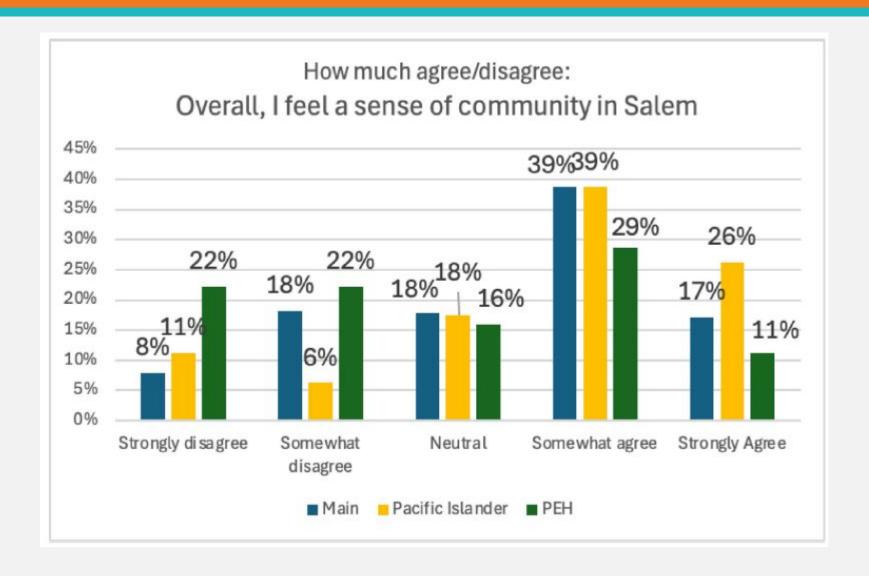

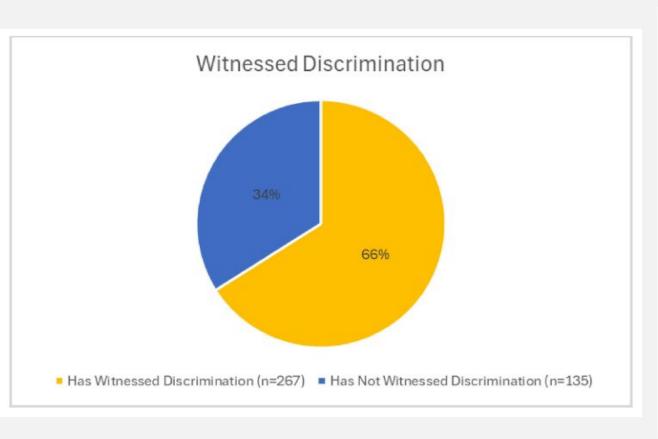

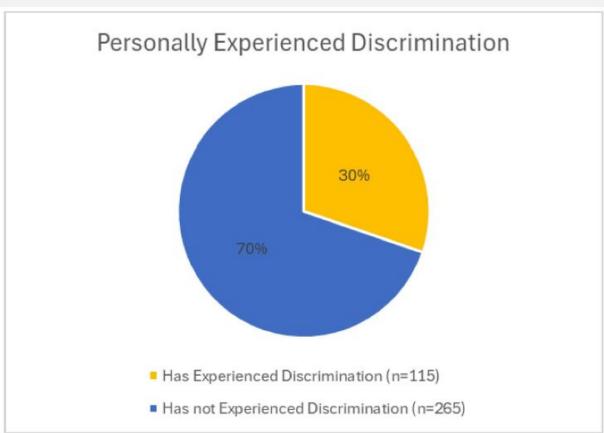






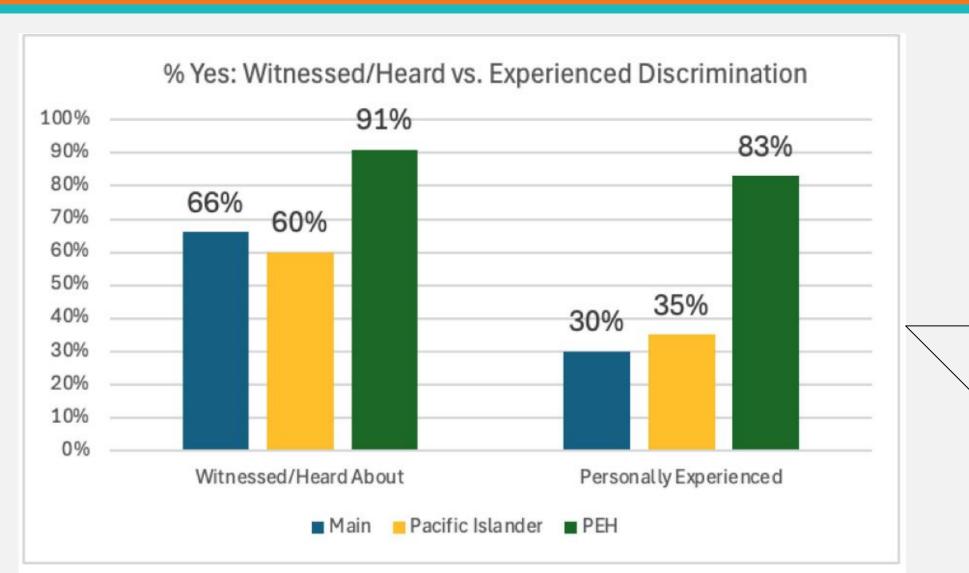

83% of PEH personally experienced discrimination

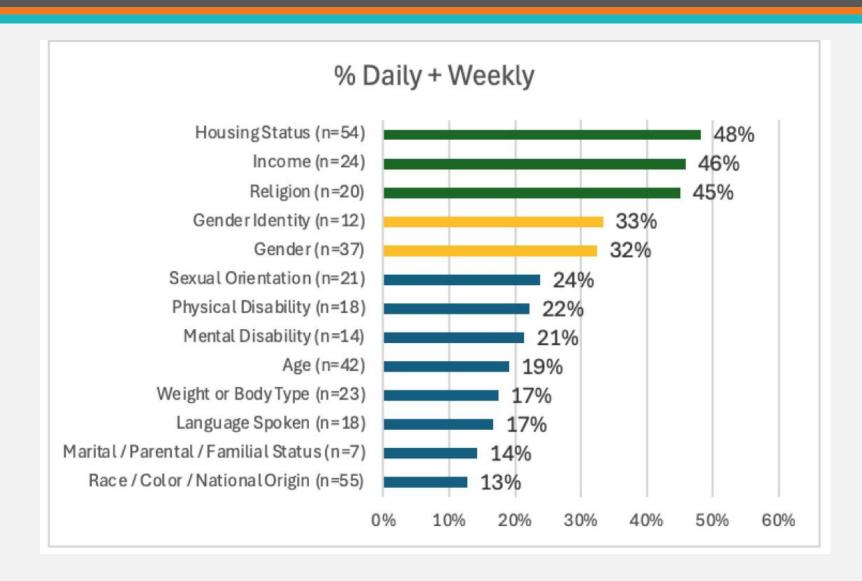
This is an 8% reduction from the 2024 survey

Key Findings - Discrimination & Housing Status



Almost half of those who experience discrimination on the basis of housing status indicate that they experience that on a daily or weekly basis.

This is down 12% from 2024.

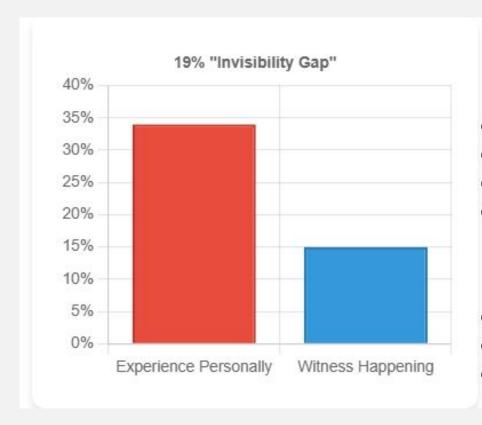


Key Findings - Discrimination & the Workplace



34% experience workplace discrimination personally.

Only 15% witness it happening to others, resulting in a 19% Invisibility Gap



Why It's Hidden

- Private decision-making processes
- One-on-one interactions
- Subtle microaggressions
- Hierarchical power dynamics

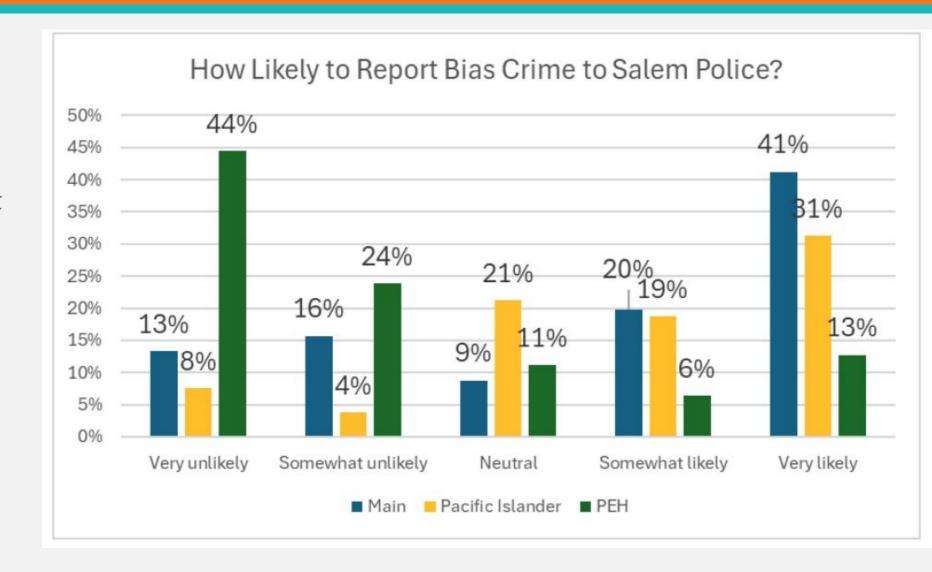
Impact on Salem

- Economic: Lost talent
- Community: Weakened engagement
- System Failure: Victims lack witnesses

Key Findings – Reporting Bias Crimes



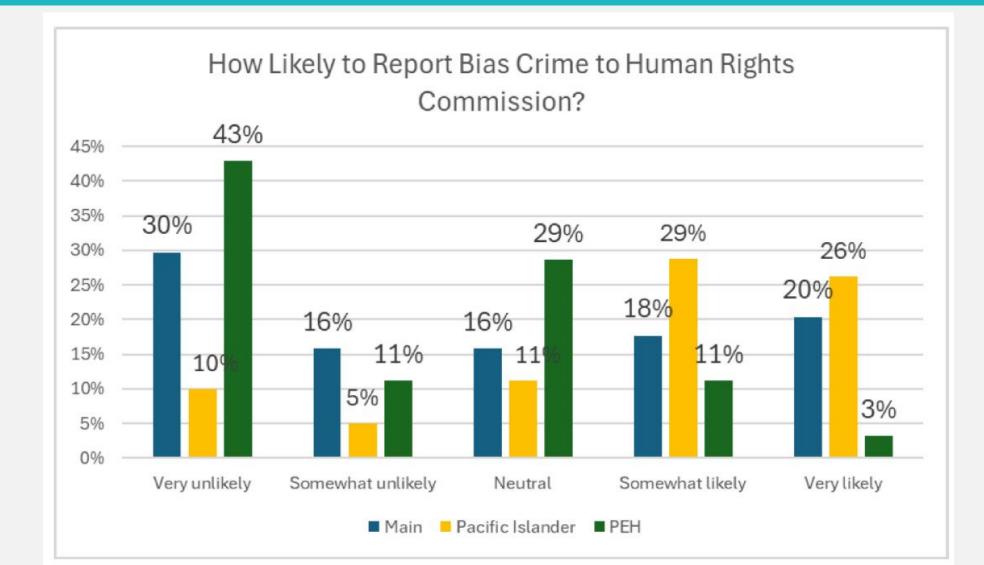
- People

- 68% were somewhat or very unlikely to report.

143 responses

Third spaces
"If you want a strong community, do not close third spaces like parks, libraries, or the senior center"

Livability Levy impact
"I only hope a majority votes for the Livability Levy to maintain and restore our library and parks.

Allow Salem Public library to stay open 48 hours a week
Allow for parks maintenance

Salem Human Rights Commission To Promote Greater Awareness of HRC's Role and Work

- Continue the work of the Community Engagement Subcommittee by seeking opportunities to table at community events.
- Host or co-lead events such as listening sessions or resource days that provide clear, accessible information about HRC and its role.
- Share the results of this survey. Share at City Council. Communicate findings to all
 the partners who helped distribute the invitation to complete the survey. Consider
 presenting a poster at Willamette Health Council's spring conference.
- Consider increasing HRC's social media presence. Launch inclusive social media campaigns in English, Spanish, and other locally spoken languages to connect with diverse audiences and explain how the HRC serves the community.

To Increase Sense of Community

- Increase access to existing community events, since community events were named
 most frequently in the comments as a way to increase sense of community. One idea to
 do this would be to approach organizers of existing community events such as World
 Beat and Salem Art Fair. Ask them to donate tickets that HRC can give away to
 community members who have never attended these particular events before.
- Continue to advocate for third spaces (Library, Center for 50+, parks). Respondents emphasized the importance of these spaces in increasing a sense of community.
