Summary:

Oregon State law requires local governments subject to Opportunity to Recycle requirements to establish and implement a program to reduce contamination that includes one or more local recycling contamination reduction goals that are consistent with the statewide goals established by the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ). To help fulfill this requirement, on October 16, 2025, the Solid Waste Committee approved a motion to forward and recommend that City Council amend City Council Policy C-25 Solid Waste Management and adopt recycling contamination goals consistent with statewide goals established by DEQ:

Goal #1: Zero high-risk contaminants

Goal #2: 10% overall contamination

development and management plan for the Wallace Natural Area.

Recommendation:

Authorize the creation of a mid-year park improvement project - "Wallace Natural Area Enhancement Project" - in the FY 2026 Extra Capacity Parks Fund 260, funded with Parks System Development Charges.

Summary:

Sections of Wallace Marine Park and Wallace Natural Area have been used for shelter by individuals experiencing homelessness in areas within the FEMA-mapped Willamette River floodway and riparian zone. Over the past 12-18 months, City staff has supported assisting people with resource and referral, and the removal of temporary shelters and associated solid waste with focus in the southern portion of the Wallace Natural Area. Paving the existing trail and developing a long-term Natural Area Development and Management Plan provides an opportunity to continue transitioning the area toward the intended purpose of a natural area park as outlined in the Comprehensive Park System Master Plan: primarily undeveloped land for conservation with compatible recreation. The plan would identify improvements beyond paving of the trail, including removal of access barriers for park users, management of user impacts, and strategies to stabilize and enhance ecological conditions.

Collective bargaining agreement between the City of Salem and the Salem Police Employees' Union and Wage Reopener for July 1, 2026.

Approve the compensation as bargained between the City and Salem Police Employees' Union (SPEU), for a period from July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027.

Summary:

The City negotiated three-year collective bargaining agreements with the Salem Police Employees' Union (SPEU), which represents

both the officers and sergeants (SPEU-S) units. The 2025-2027 agreements included a wage reopener for July 1, 2026, to be negotiated before December 16, 2025. Negotiations were conducted on October 20, 2025, and a final tentative agreement for compensation in lieu of a base wage increase was reached. The employees represented by SPEU ratified the agreement on October 31, 2025. A memorandum of understanding (MOU) will be completed to formalize the terms and conditions of the bargained wage reopener per the SPEU collective bargaining agreements if approved by the City Council.

adjustments to the FY 2026 Fee Schedule. After multiple City
Council Finance Committee meetings to consider staff's
recommendation, the Committee amended the proposal to increase
and broaden the youth recreation fee waiver program and
recommended the amended fee schedule adjustments to City
Council.

The Salem Parks and Recreation Advisory Board (SPRAB) recommends that City Council continue implementation of the seasonal "no-mow" management strategy within the Upper Oak Grove area of Bush's Pasture Park to advance long-term restoration and preservation goals identified in the Bush's Pasture Park and Deepwood Estate Gardens Cultural Landscape Management Plan (CLMP). SPRAB further recommends that Council direct staff to identify and develop designated picnic areas within subarea 13c (Picnic and Playground), as identified in the CLMP, to balance recreation and restoration objectives, and to undertake public education efforts-through signage and other communication tools-to promote understanding of the intentional management of the oak grove and its ecological and cultural importance.

Ordinance Bill No. 4-25 would amend SRC chapter 38 to include Accessory Short Term Rentals and Short Term Rentals in the STPA, requiring them to collect the STPA fee from guests. The ordinance will also modify the process for raising objections to the continuation of the STPA to provide that an operator's number of objections will be based on the number of rooms available for rent. A public hearing on the proposed changes will occur at the November 24, 2025 City Council meeting. If objections are received from operators totaling 33% or more of available rooms, the STPA will be terminated.

MEETING PROCEDURES

City Council meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. All meetings are in Loucks Auditorium Salem Public Library, 585 Liberty Street SE.

The Mayor, who is the presiding officer, is elected at large for a term of two years. Councilors are elected for four-year terms for each of the City's eight Wards. These nine officers comprise the Council who make the policy decisions for municipal activity and pass its ordinances and regulations.

Because the Mayor and Councilors' positions are part time, without pay, the Council appoints a City Manager who is responsible for the administration and execution of the City's policies and ordinances.

The City Council generally follows Robert's Rules of Order, but has adopted supplementary rules that may be found on the City's website at: https://www.cityofsalem.net/government/city-council-mayor/about-city-council/council-rules.

THE CONSENT CALENDAR

The Consent Calendar allows the Council to save time by acting on everything listed on that part of the agenda with one motion instead of considering each item separately. If a City Councilor believes a matter on the Consent Calendar deserves further discussion, the Councilor can request that item be removed from the Consent Calendar and considered separately under "Special Orders of Business."

PUBLIC COMMENT

There are two times at every regular City Council meeting when the public has an opportunity to address the City Council. The first time is immediately prior to the Consent Calendar. This time is reserved for questions or statements regarding items appearing on the agenda, except public hearings and the merits of land use issues. The second time is at the end of the agenda. At this time, you can address the City Council on any matter of public concern, other than an agenda item. Please sign up on the Speakers Roster prior to the start of the meeting. The Mayor will announce the time for public comment, and invite persons to address the City Council. Each person has three minutes to address the City Council. Please stop speaking when your time has expired.

Individuals that would like to provide comments during the meeting but are not able to attend the meeting in person may provide testimony virtually. To do so, please sign up online on the day of the meeting between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. at

PUBLIC HEARINGS

The City Council can hold public hearings to consider legislative, quasi judicial or administrative matters. To testify at a hearing, you may sign up on the Hearing Roster located in the lobby of at Loucks Auditorium before the Mayor convenes the meeting. At the time for the hearing on the agenda, the Mayor will announce when the public hearing is open. If you have signed up to speak, come forward to the podium when the Mayor calls your name. State your name and either your address or the ward you live in. If you wish to receive notice of any written decision reached at the hearing, you must provide the City Recorder your address. When you have finished speaking, the Mayor will ask the Council if there are any questions for you, so please remain at the podium for a moment.

The time limit for QUASI JUDICIAL LAND USE CASES are as follows:

- 1. Staff Presentation 10 minutes
- 2. Affected Party 10 minutes
- 3. Neighborhood Associations 5 minutes
- 4. Other Interested Persons 3 minutes per person
- 5. Rebuttal by Affected Party 5 minutes

- 5. Rebuttal by Affected Party 7 minutes

Time limits for quasi judicial land use hearings are governed by Rule 19 of the Council Rules. Parties to land use cases are encouraged to review that rule as time limits vary depending on the nature of the hearing.
