I am writing to support efforts to move the Salem Peace Mosaic from its current location on the Salem Family YMCA building to a new location in Riverfront Park. The YMCA building, including the Salem Peace Mosaic, will be torn down beginning in the fall of 2019 to make way for a new YMCA. A permanent place on city property is needed to insure that this community-developed piece of art remains in Salem. When it was first envisioned, students from McKinley Elementary participated through the work of an artist-in-residence program. As those students saw the mosaic come together, their sense of accomplishment and pride grew.

The project expanded to several schools and to at-risk youth. Giving these students a sense of belonging and the chance to participate with others to create such an impressive piece of art made a positive impact on these students' lives while also impacting our community.

Dear Board Members:

I was asked to review Agenda Item 5. I am pleased to do so, and provide comment or feedback. The Staff report and accompanying Attachments are excellent, analytical and very informative, technically based, addressing ADA access, landscape buffers and paths, integration of "The Stables" Addition into the park area, minimum impacts on open space, turf, site plans.

Earlier this year, at a SCAN Board meeting at South Salem High School, Marie Braford-Blevins, Executive Director of Salem's Riverfront Carousel provided an outreach presentation to the community on the proposed "The Stables Addition." The proposal was very well received. The SCAN Board and attendees applauded Ms. Bradford-Blevins, the designer, and Carousel volunteers.

Inclusion of the "River of Peace" mosaic has wide support in the community. Attached are letters from Sandra Burnett, Executive Director, Salem Art Association (SAA), and the principal of South Salem High School, Lara Tiffin.

Ms. Burnett's letter encourages that "all efforts be made to relocate this artwork at the Riverfront Carousel."

There is strong support for inclusion of the mosaic from civic leaders: Oregon State Representative Brian Clem, our Mayor Chuck Bennett, City Councillors Tom Andersen and Sally Cook; the Hon. Nancy MacMorris-Adix, former Chair of the Salem-Keizer School Board 24-J; and Annie Morton, a very respected educator and former principal of our local neighborhood elementary school. CANDO has endorsed the Riverfront location. As has Union Gospel Mission of Salem.

Connectivity with Youth and Children

"River of Peace" or the Salem Peace Mosaic is a very joyous art piece. It is colorful, culturally diverse, a bird, fish, a stream, a river, a snapdragon, a Panda bear, a tree, a horse, a river: a rare significant public artwork that was actually fabricated, in part, by the youth of our city, from 14 schools; and has extraordinary connectivity with the younger child. Adds a very different and new dimension to the Riverfront Park space.

In years of my observations of parks in the central city core, there is only one other authentic artwork that has that special connectivity to the smaller child, the sculpture *The Cow & the Cat* by Tom R. Arie Donch in Bush's Pasture Park, installed by volunteers in 1998, in a citizens rebuild of the Crooked House Playground.

Wise as you are to recreation, you know children are not mini-adults. The younger child is often very curious; and forms and art have a vitality, a living breathing aspect, animation and life.

Inclusion of the mosaic into artisan "The Stables" Addition by Marie Bradford-Blevins and the architects, Richard Rothweiler AIA, Alan Costic AIA AC + Co Architecture/Community is visionary, -- design and marketing genius. "A tip of the hat" to Ms. Bradford-Blevins.

Already on the Internet are puzzles proposed for 2021 using Salem's "River of Peace" or Salem Peace Mosaic.

This is an unique community piece. No other major public artwork in the park is youth fabricated. This is innovative. What we have primarily in our central city park is metal art, metal alloy, on metal, monumental (e.g., bronze, *Tom McCall Memorial* by Rip Caswell 2008 [Riverfront Park], *Guidance of Youth* by Avard T. Fairbanks, 1958 and *Sentinels* by Devin Laurence Field 2019 [Bush's Pasture Park]; or abstract form (aluminum, glass, *Good Cents* by Lillian Pitt, Mikkel and Saralyn Hilde 2018 [open space near SAIF]).

River of Peace is art of the people.

Towards A True People's Art

Locally made -- from the people. In April 2019, **John Pitman Weber**, a **co-founder of the Chicago Public Art Group** (and co-author of <u>Towards A People's Art</u>) assessed - reviewed Lynn Takata's "*River of Peace*" mosaic and concluded, he found the work to be:

"...an <u>outstanding</u> example of community public art. It is **unique** in being largely made up of <u>handmade ceramic</u> <u>elements</u> made by an extraordinary number of local residents. <u>The technical and aesthetic qualities are absolutely</u> <u>superb</u>....a brilliant example of community public art...<u>testimony to the creative strength of the Salem community</u>.."

John Pitman Weber's assessment above of the mosaic is noteworthy, deserves your consideration, and awareness in your deliberations -- and should be in the public record. An artist and a writer, he studied at the Art Institute of Chicago, Ecole Nationale Superievre des Beaux and Harvard University. His portfolio includes 40 major public works (in England, France, Spain, Latin America, USA -- New York City, Chicago, Los Angeles, cities in Georgia and Iowa); and 30 solo exhibits.

And the "River of Peace" is now to a credit to our city, our community ages 5 to 85, the vision of the artist Lynn Takata, our City's youth, our schools, outcome of the seed "Artist-in-Residence" program and SAA, Parks staff, the leadership of the Carousel and AC + Co Architecture/Community.

I would encourage your adoption of the Staff recommendations, Action Item 5. Thank you.
