#### **Summary:**

During the interim between State legislative sessions, the City Council's Legislative Committee meets monthly to consider priorities to guide Salem's Federal and State agendas. The Oregon State Legislature will convene February 5, 2024 for a short session. Before any official representing the City of Salem can attempt to influence legislation on a particular matter, during the interim or a legislative session, the City Council must adopt an official position related to that matter. To make the best use of Council and staff resources and position the City to respond more expeditiously to moving legislation, the Council approves policy statements which are intended to guide public officials and the City's contracted lobbyists in responding to and formulating positions on issues expected to come before the Oregon Legislature or topics anticipated to be addressed at the Federal level. During the short session and due to the speed at which legislation moves, the City Council often delegates authority to adopt official City positions on legislation to the Council's Legislative Committee.

On October 20, 2023, the City Council Legislative Committee met to consider Legislative priorities and policies to form Salem's State and Federal agenda (Attachment 1). The Legislative Committee is comprised of Mayor Hoy and Councilors Stapleton, Nordyke, and Phillips, with Councilor Nishioka serving as alternate.

#### **Summary:**

Amendments, Case No. CA23-04, are proposed to the Unified Development Code (UDC) to comply with new state requirements resulting from the Climate Friendly and Equitable Communities rulemaking process, as well as recently-approved State legislation aimed at allowing single-room occupancy housing more broadly in Oregon communities. The proposed code amendment will require

climate mitigation when developing new parking lots larger than one-half acre; allow existing parking lots citywide to be converted by a public agency to park and rides; allow single-room occupancy housing in all residential, commercial, and mixed-use zones; and make other clarifying changes to the UDC.

#### Summary:

#### Solid Waste Committee

In June 2023 Mayor Hoy appointed members to the new Salem City Council Solid Waste Committee (Committee). This newly formed Salem City Council sub-committee is comprised of Councilors Stapleton (Chair), Gwyn, Nishioka, Varney, and Hoy as alternate. Starting in July, the Committee met monthly to learn about the integrated solid waste system Salem works within, participate in solid waste facility tours, and engage in discussion with city staff, the city consultant, Mid-Valley, and Marion County staff about the solid waste system and rate setting process. The rate increases described in this report were presented to the Committee on October 19, 2023. The Committee approved a motion to recommend to the Salem City Council staff's proposal of solid waste rates effective January 1, 2024 and January 1, 2025.

Mid-Valley Garbage and Recycling Association (Mid-Valley), a body comprised of the six solid waste management Franchisees (haulers) serving the City of Salem is requesting the following rate increases effective January 1, 2024:

- Marion County Increase of 5.35 percent for roll cart services.
- Polk County Increase of 5.61 percent for roll cart services, 8.19 percent for container services, and 7.98 percent for drop box services.
- Medical Waste Increase of 21.5 percent for low-volume collection, 32.3 percent for high-volume collection, and 29.9 percent for hospital collection.

Mid-Valley also is requesting the following rate increases effective January 1, 2025:

- Marion County Increase of 3.35 percent for roll cart services, 2.85 percent for container services, and 0.27 percent for drop box services.
- Polk County Increase of 3.79 percent for roll cart services, 4.33 percent for container services, and 4.79 percent for drop box services.
- Medical Waste Increase of 2.8 percent for low-volume collection, 6.5 percent for high-volume collection, and 14.3 percent for hospital collection.

#### Summary:

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's (NOAA) Transformational Habitat Restoration and Coastal Resilience Grant program through the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) and Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) makes federal funds available to U.S. territories, states, local governments, Indian Tribes, institutions of higher education, non-profits and commercial organizations for transformational habitat restoration and coastal resilience. This provides an opportunity to begin funding needed improvements to the Upper and Lower Bennett Dams, which control flow in the North Santiam River at the Geren Island Water Treatment Facility (GIWTF). These improvements will restore critical habitat in the North Santiam River and protect the long-term water supply for the City of Salem (City) and Santiam Water Control District (SWCD).

#### **MEETING PROCEDURES**

City Council meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. All meetings are in the Council Chambers, Room 240, 555 Liberty St. SE.

The Mayor, who is the presiding officer, is elected at large for a term of two years. Councilors are elected for four year terms for each of the City's eight Wards. These nine officers comprise the Council who make the policy decisions for municipal activity and pass its ordinances and regulations.

Because the Mayor and Councilors' positions are part time, without pay, the Council appoints a City Manager who is responsible for the administration and execution of the City's policies and ordinances.

The City Council generally follows Robert's Rules of Order, but has adopted supplementary rules that may be found on the City's website at: http://www.cityofsalem.net/Pages/council rules.aspx.

#### THE CONSENT CALENDAR

The Consent Calendar allows the Council to save time by acting on everything listed on that part of the agenda with one motion instead of considering each item separately. If a City Councilor believes a matter on the Consent Calendar deserves further discussion, the Councilor can request that item be removed from the Consent Calendar and considered separately under "Special Orders of Business."

#### **PUBLIC COMMENT**

There are two times at every regular City Council meeting when the public has an opportunity to address the City Council. The first time is immediately prior to the Consent Calendar. This time is reserved for questions or statements regarding items appearing on the agenda, except public hearings and the merits of land use issues. The second time is at the end of the agenda. At this time, you can address the City Council on any matter of public concern, other than an agenda item. The Mayor will announce the time for public comment, and invite persons to address the City Council. Each person has three minutes to address the City Council. The time light on the podium will flash yellow when you have one minute left, and will turn red when your time has expired.

#### HOW TO GET YOUR COMMENTS INCLUDED AS PART OF THE AGENDA

Any written comments that you wish to be given to the City Council that are about an item on an agenda must be submitted to the City Recorder by 3:30 p.m. on the day of the City Council meeting when the item will be considered. #### **PUBLIC HEARINGS**

The City Council can hold public hearings to consider legislative, quasi judicial or administrative matters. To testify at a hearing, you may sign up on the Hearing Roster located near the east entrance to the Council Chambers before the Mayor convenes the meeting. At the time for the hearing on the agenda, the Mayor will announce when the public hearing is open. If you have signed up to speak, come forward to the podium when the Mayor calls your name. State your name and either your address or the ward you live in. If you wish to receive notice of any written decision reached at the hearing, you must provide the City Recorder your address. When you have finished speaking, the Mayor will ask the Council if there are any questions for you, so please remain at the podium for a moment.

The time limit is 3 minutes per person for legislative and administrative hearings. The time limits for quasi judicial hearings in non land use cases are as follows:

- 1. Staff Presentation 15 minutes
- 2. Affected Party 15 minutes
- 3. Neighborhood Associations 5 minutes
- 4. Other Interested Persons 3 minutes per person
- 5. Rebuttal by Affected Party 7 minutes

Time limits for quasi judicial land use hearings are governed by Rule 19 of the Council Rules. Parties to land use cases are encouraged to review that rule as time limits vary depending on the nature of the hearing. Timer lights are located on the podiums. A flashing yellow light means you have one minute left; a red light means your time has expired.
