Multiple Unit Housing Tax Incentive Program application by Deacon Development, LLC seeking a 10-year property tax exemption for a 105-unit apartment development located at 277 High Street NE.

<u>Summary:</u>

On March 5, 2024, Deacon Development, LLC (Steve Deacon, Member) (Applicant), submitted an application for participation in the Multiple Unit Housing Tax Incentive Program (Program) for development of a multi-family building tentatively named "High Street Apartments" (Project) on an existing, privately-owned parking lot and the site of the former Salem City Hall in downtown Salem (demolished 1972). The Project will consist of one 23,164 square foot building containing 105 residential rental units.

The Applicant has submitted applications and materials asserting compliance with all Program requirements. The Project contains more than two dwelling units, is located within the Core Area, and meets 8 of the 19 public benefit requirements. Adoption of Resolution No. 2024-15 (Attachments 1, 2, 3) would approve the application by Deacon Development, LLC for tax exemption of the multiple family residential portion of the property under the Program.

	Adopt Resolution No. 2024-16 authorizing a transfer of \$150,000 in appropriations within the City's FY 2024 budget for unanticipated charges.
<u>Summary:</u>	
	A transfer from contingency in the amount of \$150,000 is needed to repair damage at the Library parking structure from a motor vehicle accident that occurred in December 2023. Facilities and Risk staff were notified of the incident and have since had the area inspected for the level of repair needed. Work for engineering, permitting, and repair are included in this cost.
	A Library patron was the driver of the motor vehicle. A claim has been filed with the City's property insurance carrier to reimburse the cost of the repair less the deductible. The City's insurance will pursue payment from the private insurance carrier of the motor vehicle.

<u>Summary:</u>

2024 is the fifth and final year of grant funding received under the Willamette Mainstem Anchor Habitat Investments Program for implementation of the Minto Island Conservation Area (MICA) Phase 3 restoration project. Despite nearly five years of repeated treatment of invasive plants and installation of over 75,000 native plants in this 48-acre area, it has become clear that the work to restore native floodplain forest and shrub habitat is far from over. Aggressive invasive plants continue to threaten successful establishment of native vegetation and floodplain functions. An Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) Open Solicitation Restoration grant is being sought to address this issue. If awarded, the funds will allow the City to continue restoration work for an additional five years, slightly expand the treatment area, and adapt additional methods to better address site conditions.

Authorize the City Manager to apply for the Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) Technical Assistance Grant and, if successful, enter into an agreement with OWEB to accept the grant funds.

<u>Summary:</u>

Substantial federal, state, and private funding opportunities exist for removal of fish passage barriers (e.g., undersized or perched culverts, historic diversions and dams, etc.) on streams that support native migratory and anadromous fish. Most of Salem's streams provide habitat for a variety of native fish, and Mill, Pringle, Glenn and Gibson Creeks are categorized as essential salmonid habitat by the Oregon Department of State Lands owing to their historic and continued role in providing habitat for federally protected spring Chinook and winter steelhead. Removal of fish passage barriers often overlaps with infrastructure capital improvement needs, resulting in highly fundable multi-benefit projects. However, current data related to fish passage barriers in Salem is outdated and incomplete, making it difficult to justify project need from the fish perspective and resulting in lower success rates for securing fish passage grants. An Oregon Watershed Enhancement Board (OWEB) Open Solicitation Technical Assistance grant is being sought to address this issue.

The matter of *Cynthia Garza v. City of Salem, et. al.* is pending before Marion County Circuit Court. The matter involves a car accident involving a City of Salem Police vehicle and a vehicle in which Ms. Garza was a passenger and was injured in the accident. The City was likely at fault for causing the accident. The parties have tentatively agreed to resolve all Ms. Garza's claims for \$195,000 and a release agreement.

	When a municipal bond is valued above the market interest rate the buyers pay a premium in order to secure the bonds. This premium is paid to the issuer (the City) with the same restrictions as the balance of the bond dollars.

MEETING PROCEDURES

City Council meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. All meetings are in the Council Chambers, Room 240, 555 Liberty St. SE.

The Mayor, who is the presiding officer, is elected at large for a term of two years. Councilors are elected for four year terms for each of the City's eight Wards. These nine officers comprise the Council who make the policy decisions for municipal activity and pass its ordinances and regulations.

Because the Mayor and Councilors' positions are part time, without pay, the Council appoints a City Manager who is responsible for the administration and execution of the City's policies and ordinances.

THE CONSENT CALENDAR

The Consent Calendar allows the Council to save time by acting on everything listed on that part of the agenda with one motion instead of considering each item separately. If a City Councilor believes a matter on the Consent Calendar deserves further discussion, the Councilor can request that item be removed from the Consent Calendar and considered separately under "Special Orders of Business."

PUBLIC COMMENT

There are two times at every regular City Council meeting when the public has an opportunity to address the City Council. The first time is immediately prior to the Consent Calendar. This time is reserved for questions or statements regarding items appearing on the agenda, except public hearings and the merits of land use issues. The second time is at the end of the agenda. At this time, you can address the City Council on any matter of public concern, other than an agenda item. The Mayor will announce the time for public comment, and invite persons to address the City Council. Each person has three minutes to address the City Council. The time light on the podium will flash yellow when you have one minute left, and will turn red when your time has expired.

HOW TO GET YOUR COMMENTS INCLUDED AS PART OF THE AGENDA

Any written comments that you wish to be given to the City Council that are about an item on an agenda must be submitted to the City Recorder by 3:30 p.m. on the day of the City Council meeting when the item will be considered. PUBLIC HEARINGS


The City Council can hold public hearings to consider legislative, quasi judicial or administrative matters. To testify at a hearing, you may sign up on the Hearing Roster located near the east entrance to the Council Chambers before the Mayor convenes the meeting. At the time for the hearing on the agenda, the Mayor will announce when the public hearing is open. If you have signed up to speak, come forward to the podium when the Mayor calls your name. State your name and either your address or the ward you live in. If you wish to receive notice of any written decision reached at the hearing, you must provide the City Recorder your address. When you have finished speaking, the Mayor will ask the Council if there are any questions for you, so please remain at the podium for a moment.

The time limit is 3 minutes per person for legislative and administrative hearings. The time limits for quasi judicial hearings in non land use cases are as follows:

- **1.** Staff Presentation 15 minutes
- 2. Affected Party 15 minutes
- 3. Neighborhood Associations 5 minutes
- 4. Other Interested Persons 3 minutes per person
- 5. Rebuttal by Affected Party 7 minutes

Time limits for quasi judicial land use hearings are governed by Rule 19 of the Council Rules. Parties to land use cases are encouraged to review that rule as time limits vary depending on the nature of the hearing. Timer lights are located on the podiums. A flashing yellow light means you have one minute left; a red light means your time has expired.



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
