<u>Summary:</u>

The Salem-Keizer Area Transportation Study (SKATS) is soliciting grant applications for transportation projects to be considered for funding in fiscal years 2024 through 2029. Eligible projects recommend for submittal are three projects on Commercial Street SE and McGilchrist Street SE and two joint projects with Marion County on State Street and Center Street NE.

Recommendation:

Approve the recommended Fire Management compensation changes including an increase of 7% to the Fire Management pay grades retroactive to January 1, 2022; an increase of 5% to the pay grades effective July 1, 2022 (in addition to cost-of-living adjustment if adopted through budget); an increase of 3% effective November 1, 2022, or at time of annual performance; and an increase in employer contribution to retirement accounts effective March 1, 2022.

<u>Summary:</u>

There is significant compensation compression between Fire Management classifications of Deputy Fire Chief and Assistant Fire Chief and represented Fire (IAFF) ranks. Compensation compression decreases internal interest in promotional opportunities and makes the management positions less attractive to external candidates. To maintain equity between all Fire classifications and encourage career progression, adjustments are needed to the Fire Management compensation.

<u>Summary:</u>

Through its annual City Council Policy Agenda, City Council makes its initial priorities for action clear to staff and the community and provides direction on aligning resources towards the Strategic Plan Policy areas through the City's budgeting process. Each fall, City Council develops a framework for its policy priorities. In its November 15, 2021 Work Session, Council considered progress achieved on 2021 Policy Agenda priorities, community feedback from the 2021 Community Satisfaction Survey, and updates on major initiatives in the 2021 Community Report. Discussion of initial priorities was concentrated in four areas: (1) responding to our sheltering crisis; (2) planning for our future; (3) engaging our community; and (4) sustaining infrastructure and services. In a Work Session each January, staff return with proposals for how to achieve City Council priorities. In April, the City's budgeting process begins, with final City Council action taken in June.

In January 2021, Salem's City Council took two decisive actions to further the City's commitment to diversity, equity, and inclusion. The Council adopted two resolutions: one condemning racism and white supremacy, and the other recognizing racism as a public health crisis. Further investments in the FY 22 Budget included a new Diversity Equity and Inclusion Coordinator position, with the express intent to increase diversity of hiring as one outcome of the work. As an organization, the City is putting equity in action through access improvements to our programs and services, in business supports and livable wage job creation, and in how we plan for the future of Our Salem and action need to mitigate effects of climate change.

Engrossed Ordinance Bill No. 13-21 updates the Unified Development Code (UDC) and other identified chapters of the Salem Revised Code to address issues that have arisen since the last major update to the UDC in 2019. Engrossed Ordinance Bill No. 13-21 amends Salem Revised Code Title X (Unified Development Code) and other identified code chapters to comply with recent changes in State law. The ordinance also changes the zoning of properties within the downtown in the General Retail/Office overlay zone that are currently zoned RH (Multiple Family High-Residential), CO (Commercial Office), and CR (Retail Commercial) to CB (Central Business District).

MEETING PROCEDURES

City Council meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 6:00 p.m. All meetings are in the Council Chambers, Room 240, 555 Liberty St. SE.

The Mayor, who is the presiding officer, is elected at large for a term of two years. Councilors are elected for four year terms for each of the City's eight Wards. These nine officers comprise the Council who make the policy decisions for municipal activity and pass its ordinances and regulations.

Because the Mayor and Councilors' positions are part time, without pay, the Council appoints a City Manager who is responsible for the administration and execution of the City's policies and ordinances.

The City Council generally follows Robert's Rules of Order, but has adopted supplementary rules that may be found on the City's website at: http://www.cityofsalem.net/Pages/council rules.aspx.

THE CONSENT CALENDAR

The Consent Calendar allows the Council to save time by acting on everything listed on that part of the agenda with one motion instead of considering each item separately. If a City Councilor believes a matter on the Consent Calendar deserves further discussion, the Councilor can request that item be removed from the Consent Calendar and considered separately under "Special Orders of Business."

PUBLIC COMMENT

There are two times at every regular City Council meeting when the public has an opportunity to address the City Council. The first time is immediately prior to the Consent Calendar. This time is reserved for questions or statements regarding items appearing on the agenda, except public hearings and the merits of land use issues. The second time is at the end of the agenda. At this time, you can address the City Council on any matter of public concern, other than an agenda item. The Mayor will announce the time for public comment, and invite persons to address the City Council. Each person has three minutes to address the City Council. The time light on the podium will flash yellow when you have one minute left, and will turn red when your time has expired.

HOW TO GET YOUR COMMENTS INCLUDED AS PART OF THE AGENDA

Any written comments that you wish to be given to the City Council that are about an item on an agenda must be submitted to the City Recorder by 3:30 p.m. on the day of the City Council meeting when the item will be considered. If you have some matter that you wish to have the City Council consider in the future, you are encouraged to submit your suggestion in writing to the City Manager at 555 Liberty Street SE, Room 220, Salem, OR, or by e mail to: manager@cityofsalem.net.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

The City Council can hold public hearings to consider legislative, quasi judicial or administrative matters. To testify at a hearing, you may sign up on the Hearing Roster located near the east entrance to the Council Chambers before the Mayor convenes the meeting. At the time for the hearing on the agenda, the Mayor will announce when the public hearing is open. If you have signed up to speak, come forward to the podium when the Mayor calls your name. State your name and either your address or the ward you live in. If you wish to receive notice of any written decision reached at the hearing, you must provide the City Recorder your address. When you have finished speaking, the Mayor will ask the Council if there are any questions for you, so please remain at the podium for a moment.

The time limit is 3 minutes per person for legislative and administrative hearings. The time limits for quasi judicial hearings in non land use cases are as follows:

- 1. Staff Presentation 15 minutes
- 2. Affected Party 15 minutes
- 3. Neighborhood Associations 5 minutes
- 4. Other Interested Persons 3 minutes per person
- 5. Rebuttal by Affected Party 7 minutes

Time limits for quasi judicial land use hearings are governed by Rule 19 of the Council Rules. Parties to land use cases are encouraged to review that rule as time limits vary depending on the nature of the hearing.
