| Message       | Church at the Park (C@P) is collaboratively working to expand shelter sites, with<br>the goal of operating sites in all eight wards in Salem. This month, we are<br>presenting the City Council with four new sites. If each of the four sites is<br>approved, 120 new shelters could be purchased and placed. The focus of our Micro<br>Shelter Communities is the provision of a safe, sanitary, and supportive<br>environment for guests to take the next steps towards housing and employment.<br>With 24/7 staffing and on-site services, C@P seeks to maintain an environment of<br>hope, dignity and holistic care. C@P staff is well-trained to support those facing<br>the challenges and realities of homelessness. By providing a stable living<br>environment and support, we have seen many people exit our shelters into<br>permanent housing and gainful employment. Currently, we have 20 shelters at our<br>Village of Hope site on Portland Road. Those shelters were purchased from Pallet<br>Shelters, based out of Tacoma. Each shelter has two beds and a heater, which<br>necessitates that they be in sites with power. An additional 30 shelters are located<br>at our Catholic Community Services site. These "Livables" were designed by Russ<br>Monk and High Impact Technologies, based out of Salem. They have twice the<br>insulation as the Pallet Shelters and can be used on sites without power. "Livables"<br>can also have more than two beds to accommodate families with children. We are<br>encouraged to announce to our 250 shelter donors that we have arranged a contract<br>with a third shelter provider. Adomo is based out of Salem and has used Russ<br>Monk's design to create a locally sourced, highly insulated, and heated & cooled<br>shelter. C@P believes this shelter is the model which best meets the guest's needs<br>of durability, cleanable, and suited for all seasons. The cost of the new shelter is<br>\$5,900. When the new sites are approved by the Salem City Council, Adomo<br>confirms they can produce up to 5 shelters a week. 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While I have numerous concerns regarding the placement of micro-shelters on the Peace Plaza, I will discuss only one herein.

The Peace Plaza is across the street from a residential neighborhood, the Gaiety Hill Historic Neighborhood. Protecting the availability of street parking within the neighborhood has been a years-long effort.

When the city installed parking meters in the Library parking garage, the residential streets became the parking place of choice for Library patrons. While those are short term stays, the day-long parking by Library staff and City Hall workers resulted in the development of a permit process. Only people who reside in the neighborhood can obtain permits to park their cars on the street or to give to their guests.

The people who would live in the micro-shelters at the Peace Plaza would live in the neighborhood so, no doubt, would be eligible for parking permits for their vehicles, campers & RV's operable or not. One need only drive by the existing micro-shelter locations to observe how many vehicles are there.

In selecting a site for these developments, I ask that the Council members consider the livability of the people who take great pride in maintaining the historic beauty of their neighborhood.
