I would like to provide the following written public comment on the proposed UDC updates for the November 14th public hearing. I am <u>in support</u> of all the listed updates (both those required by state law and those the City proposed of its own accord). The Unified Development Code could, however, use much further simplification. The housing shortage was caused in part by a nationwide pattern of exclusionary copy and paste code like Salem's, which is restrictive and favors only the most expensive housing types (single family on large lots). This is precisely why the state has stepped in to supersede the prescriptive zoning and expensive offstreet parking requirements in places like Salem.

These UDC changes are a great starting point to make Salem more equitable and inclusive, but we can do better than the bare minimum. It's time to stop micromanaging development and set the stage for a future where an adequate housing supply can mean the end of homelessness in Salem.
