Writing grants, procuring donations, reviewing land use decisions – these are valuable activities that the city gets unpaid service from. Why put term limits on donations?

Term limits is not an idea that worked very well with the State Legislature. When there were term limits, there were new faces without institutional memory. The lobbyists, unelected people were running the state because the elected representatives did not understand the intricate rules of writing legislation and the committee process.
