I am a lifelong learner, a college professor who has benefitted from libraries since my early childhood. I understand the central role that the library plays in Salem, not simply as a repository of books and other materials, but as a safe gathering and learning space for all members of the community, particularly those who are traditionally underserved. I have experience with fundraising at Willamette University (soliciting colleagues to contribute to our annual fund) and would be happy to support fundraising efforts on behalf of the library.

List any experience you have with volunteering for the City of Salem or other organizations.

I have volunteered as a Russian language teacher at the Oregon State Correctional Institution (OSCI) on a biweekly basis since December of 2018. Unfortunately, due to the pandemic, I have not been able to visit the prison since early this spring, but I remain in contact with my students and have sent them CDs with Russian-language recordings. I look forward to getting back to this work as soon as possible. When my children were younger, I volunteered in classrooms at Candalaria Elementary School.

I attended the Salem/Keizer public school system redistricting meetings and spoke in favor of increased equity and inclusion for our marginalized communities. Since the pandemic began, I have been attending Salem/Keizer School Board Meetings via Zoom. I supported my neighborhood association's renovation of the Nelson Park playground.

I used the curbside pickup on June 25th (and I'll be back tomorrow for a new pickup). I was delighted to see this service added amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. The online sign-up system was clear, and my requested book was ready and waiting for me. I have also recently used the online library services, downloading audiobooks as recently as yesterday (7/15) and seeking book recommendations from librarians via the library's Facebook page last month.

In your opinion, what role does the Salem Public Library play in making Salem a livable community?

The Salem Public Library is an essential community service. My family and I are regular users; we visited once a week on average before the pandemic. We are avid readers and appreciate being able to borrow rather than purchase books. Losing that access because of the pandemic has been difficult, and I am delighted that the library is expanding its services with curbside pickup. We also, of course, greatly appreciate the online services and resources the library provides. In addition to accessing books, videos, music, etc., we regularly take advantage of library programming, for ex. summer reading programs and public events. My son, Max Bishop, is a member of the Teen Advisory Board; he has found a wonderful community of peers there, and Sonia Somerville provides excellent mentorship. We have attended many a community event at Loucks auditorium, including our children's music recitals and their friends' CET performances. The library also provides several meeting areas and gathering spaces for all sorts of community organizations, reading groups, and study sessions. These are just a few of the services that make our very privileged family's life more livable. For underserved members of the community, the library is even more essential. It provides a safe, comfortable space to access computers and internet services, and a place to sit and escape the summer heat and the winter rain. While I am very glad that the library is receiving necessary renovations, I know that it's temporary closure is a great loss to many members of our community--even more so now that the temporary location has had to severely limit services due to the pandemic. I imagine that its services will be even more important in the future.
